SAFETY

SWANA continues its strategic focus on promoting safety and reducing the injury and fatality rates in our industry. There are numerous resources available to train your workforce in methods to being safe each and every day. In addition, the National Waste & Recycling Association has teamed up with a national fleet trucking safety organization called Together for Safer Roads to offer a

fleet safety program to the independent haulers that may not have a large robust internal system. This program, along with SWANA's, helps companies adopt best practices for improving the safety culture of the organization. No matter which organization you choose, the most important part is to focus on safety and provide the necessary training to keep our employees safe each day.

PROJECTS IN THE MAKING

As many of us know landfills, especially in the northeast, are running out of space with facilities continuing to close. Many of them locally and nationwide face challenges to remain profitable while fulfilling the needs of their evergrowing communities. Designing and permitting landfill expansions is often a maze of regulatory roadblocks and limiting acreage. Airspace is at a premium.

Routinely landfill owners turn consultants, many of whom are SWANA members to capture cost-effective airspace. As part of our effort to share information with the membership, SNE SWANA asked Geosyntec Consultants, Inc., to share details on a project that incorporated a mechanically stabilized earth (MSE) berm into a landfill expansion design, which significantly increased airspace gain compared to an expansion using a perimeter berm with traditional 3:1 slopes. The relatively small footprint of MSE berms, when compared to traditional perimeter berms, reduces the acres needed to expand and creates much-coveted additional airspace. It also allows the landfill footprint to be maximized adjacent to any buffer zone. Although historically MSE structures have been permitted for earth-retaining projects, such as road and bridge foundations, their use in landfill expansion can be a hard sell to some state regulators.

A well-designed, well-built, and properly monitored and maintained MSE berm is an effective and efficient solution to a landfill expansion. The key to incorporating this into the project is ensure you have a solid design and that quality is built into the construction oversight such that the regulatory community is ensured that this project will not have any detrimental effects upon the community or environment.

Geosyntec, an industry leader in MSE berm design and permitting, did just that for the Fitchburg/Westminster Sanitary Landfill in Massachusetts (a Waste Management of Massachusetts landfill site)—a state that had not permitted MSE berms for landfill expansion for about a decade. Part of the success was including a robust construction quality assurance program and a wellthought-out monitoring and maintenance plan. The experience and expertise offered by these SWANA members, along with the ability to educate and negotiate with regulators helped Geosyntec's client get permit approval for a 750 foot-long, 40-foot-high MSE berm, which will create nearly 2 million cubic yards of additional capacity in our Region. REGULATORY UPDATES

FEDERAL: The U.S. EPA finalized its long-awaited drinking water standards for per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances on April 10th. The new standards included additional limits than those originally proposed and sets phasing in of these limits over multiple years. This new rule coincides with the release of the updated interim guidance of the destruction and disposal of this chemical group. Many of us are working to determine what this means for our industry in terms of wastewater disposal and management of materials at our sites. Stay tuned for more information from SWANA as it develops.

CT: The Solid Waste Advisory Committee held its meeting on March 26, 2024. During that meeting, representatives from various agencies provided updates on EPR programs for tires and gas cylinders, EV battery recycling, and regulatory / legislative updates. The next meeting is scheduled for June 25, 2024.
